I, Charles B. "Chuck" Sullivan, the undersigned District Attorney of said County, in the name and by the authority of the State of Oklahoma, give information that in said County of Pittsburg and in the State of Oklahoma, DERAJE NATHANIEL JACKSON did then and there unlawfully, willfully, knowingly and wrongfully commit the crime(s) of:

COUNT 1: MURDER IN THE FIRST DEGREE ~ a CLASS Y FELONY, on or about the 1st day of January, 2020, in Pittsburg County, Oklahoma by unlawfully and with malice aforethought causing the death of another human being, to-wit: Dustin Parker by shooting him in the head and Dustin Parker did in fact die as a result of the wounds inflicted by Deraje Nathaniel Jackson.

This crime is punishable by death, imprisonment for life, or imprisonment for life without parole.

SUPPLEMENTAL INFORMATION FOR

I, Charles B. "Chuck" Sullivan, the undersigned District Attorney of said County, in the name and by the authority of the State of Oklahoma, and in addition to the original information filed herein, further inform the Court as follows:

That the defendant was heretofore on July 11, 2022, case CF-2022-72, represented by an attorney in the District Court of Pittsburg County, State of Oklahoma, convicted of a felony, to-wit: the crime of **Possession of Firearm After Former Felony Conviction** and sentenced to 4 years in the Department of Corrections.

That the defendant was heretofore on November 30, 2017, case CF-2017-677, represented by an attorney in the District Court of Pittsburg County, State of Oklahoma, convicted of a felony, to-wit: the crime of **Unlawful Possession of Controlled Drug with Intent to Distribute** and sentenced to 5 years in the Department of Corrections.

That the defendant was heretofore on August 14, 2017, case CF-2017-525, represented by an attorney in the District Court of Pittsburg County, State of Oklahoma, convicted of a felony, to-wit: the crime of **five (5) counts of Uttering Forged Instrument** and sentenced to 1 year suspended on each count. Said counts to run consecutive to each other but concurrent with the other cases. Further, on November 30, 2017, the sentence was revoked in full on each count, with counts running consecutive to each other.

That the defendant was heretofore on August 14, 2017, case CF-2017-512, represented by an attorney in the District Court of Pittsburg County, State of Oklahoma, convicted of a felony, to-wit: the crime of **Uttering Forged Instrument** and sentenced to 1 year suspended. Further, on November 29, 2017, the sentence was revoked in full.

That the defendant was heretofore on June 15, 2016, case CF-2016-252, represented by an attorney in the District Court of Pittsburg County, State of Oklahoma, convicted of a felony, to-wit: the crime of **Burglary in the Second Degree** and sentenced to 7 years with the balance suspended upon successful completion of Keys to Life or equivalent program. Further, on November 29, 2017, the sentence was revoked for 5 years with the balance to remain suspended.

That the defendant was heretofore on June 15, 2016, case CF-2015-562, represented by an attorney in the District Court of Pittsburg County, State of Oklahoma, convicted of a felony, to-wit: the crime of **Count 1: Plan/Attempt/Conspire to Perform Act of Violence and Count 3: Carrying Weapon with Unlawful Intent** and sentence to Count 1: 5 years and Count 3: 2 years with the balance suspended upon successful completion of Keys to Life or equivalent Program. Further, on November 29, 2017, the sentence was revoked in full on both counts.

That the defendant was heretofore on June 15, 2016, case CF-2015-551, represented by an attorney in the District Court of Pittsburg County, State of Oklahoma, convicted of a felony, to-wit: the crime of **Count 1: Burglary in the Second Degree and Count 2: Burglary in the Second Degree** and sentence on both counts to 7 years with the balance suspended upon successful completion of Keys to Life or equivalent Program. Further, on November 29, 2017, the sentence was revoked for 5 years with the balance to remain suspended.

That the defendant was heretofore on June 15, 2016, case CF-2015-550, represented by an attorney in the District Court of Pittsburg County, State of Oklahoma, convicted of a felony, to-wit: the crime of **Knowingly Concealing Stolen Property** and sentenced to 5 years with the balance suspended upon successful completion of Keys to Life or equivalent Program. Further, on November 29, 2017, the sentence was revoked for 5 years.

MURDER FIRST DEGREE

Facts & Circumstances that support probable cause to arrest the above named person are:

On the date 1 January 2020, at appx. 0639 hours, I, Patrolman Kirk Johnston, was waiting to go on-duty and heard officers dispatched to the area of Komar at B St. and Cherokee in reference to a caller hearing numerous gunshots in the area. I heard officers on the radio that they were in the area. I heard Patrolman Danny McHenry radio that he was in the area of B St. and

Delaware and had a victim and needed a medic. I went to this location, along with other officers. I arrived and met with Capt. Brent McAlester, who requested that I tape off the scene with crime scene tape and start a Crime Scene Log. I taped off a wide area around what I saw to be a Rover Taxi car parked in the 200 Block of West Delaware. In the driver's seat, I saw what appeared to be a white male with blood all over the head and body. I blocked off the East and West ends of West Delaware. I noted what officers were in the crime scene when I started the Crime Scene Log, along with McAlester Fire Dept. personnel. I spoke to Fireman Shane Murray and asked him to call dispatch to give the names of the firemen that responded for the call log. The Department's Detective Division was notified, as the driver of the taxi was deceased, and it appeared to have been caused by possible gunshot wounds to the victim's head. I was made aware that personnel with the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation had been contacted as well to assist with the crime scene. There was a small dog in the taxi, which was removed by Capt. Kevin Hearod and held in a patrol car. Animal Control had been requested to come pick up the dog, which he did.

OSBI personnel, John Graham, Jordan Toyne, and Larry Boggus arrived on-scene and began to process the scene, while I maintained the Crime Scene Log. Oklahoma State Medical Examiner Chris Cole arrived to process the scene. Cole requested that I have dispatch contact a funeral home to transport the body. Once the scene was processed, Brumley Mills Funeral Home arrived to transport the body. Detectives were able to find out the identity of the victim, as Dustin Parker. Parker's Oklahoma Driver's License was found later. I attached a photograph of Parker's license to the media files. I included my handwritten notes of the Crime Scene Log and prepared a typed Crime Scene Log for the report, which was also added in the media files. Advantage Wrecker was requested to impound the Rover Taxi, which was a gray 2017 Chevrolet Bolt, and be held for Detective Division. Other officers were in the area trying to gather any information on a possible suspect.

While waiting for OSBI to process the scene, I was standing with Detective Max Clark, and we saw a male walking from A St., down Delaware, and towards the crime scene tape. We walked up and spoke to the male, who was an older white male with a graying beard and hair. He said he worked at Rover Taxi with the victim. We talked to the male, who was visibly upset over the loss of Parker. We asked him about him knowing Parker and about Rover giving rides the previous night for free, due to New Years Eve. He said that some rides were free, but some were not. He said all drivers carry a small money bag in the taxis with their names on them. He said that he thinks that Parker carried a turquoise money bag but was not sure of the color. The male said that they typically only carried about \$20 to \$30 in the bag at any given time. He did not have any other information of import. While OSBI was processing the vehicle, no money bag was found in the taxi to my knowledge.

The case had been investigated by multiple personnel and agencies from the time of report, in 2020, until the present. I was currently working in the capacity of the Lieutenant in the McAlester Police Department's Criminal Investigative Division on 20 March 2026. On this day, I received a phone call from our dispatch that a male was downstairs at the Police Department and needed to talk to someone. I was told that the male stated he had shot someone 6 years ago and needed to talk to someone. I went downstairs, along with Sgt. Kyle Sharp. We met with a male who identified himself as Deraje Jackson. He had been brought to the station by his brother. Deraje told us that he had shot someone about 6 years ago and wanted to turn himself in and talk to us. We took him up to the 3rd floor, to my office. I told Deraje that I wanted to hear what he had to tell us, but that I would be reading him his Miranda Rights and Waiver first. Detective Sgt. Kyle Sharp set in my office with me while I spoke to Deraje. I read him his Miranda Rights and Waiver, on this date, at 12:58 PM. Deraje agreed to speak to me, and

signed the waiver form. I obtained Deraje's personal information and the went in to asking him to tell me what happened, and asking questions to clarify certain things. He said that this happened around 2020 on January 1st, on Delaware. At this point, I remembered this case from having taken the initial report on it, and being the first officer to arrive on the scene. Deraje said that he had gotten a cab ride and it was less than a mile ride. He said he was charged \$20 for the ride and felt like he had been ripped off. He said that he thought the cab driver's name was Dustin. He said that the cab driver had a camera in the cab pointed towards him and it made him angry. Deraje said that after he was dropped off by the cab, he waited for some time. He said that he called the cab company back for a ride and waited in someone's yard on Delaware St. He had recalled he was in an area where there were a couple of vacant houses. He said that the cab pulled up and he saw it was the same driver as before. Deraje said that he walked up on him and shot him. He said that he was on the driver's side of the cab and shot about 8 times. I asked him about the gun that he used, and he said it was a Ruger 9mm semi-automatic handgun. I asked him where he gun is now, and he said that he threw it into a lake around Grandview, MO. I asked him if he had used any drugs or other substances prior to shooting the cab driver. Deraje said that he was using several drugs at the time, but had not used at the time of the incident. Deraje said that he was by himself during the shooting, and just prior to it. He said that it was about 5 or 6 in the morning when it happened.

I asked Deraje what compelled him to come in today. He said that he had been setting around pondering it. He said that he had been in prison in Holdenville, OK, and he had been out about two years. He said that it changed him and he had been thinking about this incident. He told me that he knew some people in the military and he did not want his actions to affect them.

I asked him where he went right after the shooting, in detail. He said that he went West from the scene, then South, and then East. He said that he went to a house where some friends lived on the East side of town. Deraje said that about 1 to 2 days after the incident, he took a bus to Kansas City, MO. He said that he then took an Uber down to Grandview, MO. He said that his mother and father live there, along with a brother. I asked him about who he had told about this. He said he told his parents, but only vaguely that he shot someone, and did not give them any details about it. I asked him about the lake he threw the gun into. He said it was called Longview Lake in Grandview. He said he had his cousin take him there. Deraje said he does not remember what part of the lake it was and that the cousin that took him there is deceased now.

I concluded the interview and told Deraje he was under arrest for the murder. I placed him into handcuffs and had a patrol officer transport him to the Pittsburg County Sheriff's Office to be booked into jail. Charges are to be filed in Pittsburg County District Court for the charges of 1st Degree Murder.
